What differences and similarities are there between George now and George as she was 55 years earlier?




What evidence can you find that George's previous adventures have shaped the person that she is now?

'Well what does he want then?' Fran sounded scared. 'Georgina knows very well what I want,' said the man in a mocking tone of voice.










Discussion Questions:

What does Julian's statement, "Chin up," suggest about his character and how he feels about Raymond?

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
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N FROM CHAPTER 18: The Mystery of Kirrin Cave

Why does George carefully check in all directions before leading the group to the cave?


Why does George explain the rope-ladder by saying, "I find this easier these days"? What does that tell you about her?

What do you think George means when she says the island has been her "second home since long before you were born"?







