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KING LEAR

ACT 1

- Why do Goneril and Regan lie to their father?
- Why might Lear believe them instead of Cordelia?
- How do you think Cordelia feels when her father banishes her?
- What clues show that Lear is beginning to make unwise decisions?
- Do you think Lear's test was fair? Why or why not?
- Should children always tell their parents the truth, even if it hurts?
- What does this act teach us about pride and honesty?



ACT 2

- What do Edmund's words tell us about how he feels about being illegitimate?
- How does the Fool try to warn Lear about his mistake?
- What does Goneril's behaviour show about her character?
- Who do you trust more Edmund or Edgar? Why?
- How do lies cause problems in this act?
- · What would you have done differently if you were King Lear?

ACT 3

- How does the storm mirror Lear's emotions?
- Why does Lear start to feel sorry for the poor and homeless people?
- · What does the Fool mean when he says Lear is 'a shadow of himself?
- How does the storm help Lear begin to change?
- · Why is it important that Lear still has people who care about him?
- · How would you feel if you were caught outside in a storm like this?

- How does Gloucester's blindness symbolise something more than physical pain?
- Why does Edgar choose not to tell his father who he really is?
- How does Cordelia show kindness and forgiveness?
- Which character shows the most loyalty in this act?
- Why do you think suffering helps some people understand others better?
- Should Cordelia forgive her father after what he did?





ACT 5

- Why does Edmund change his mind too late?
- What emotions do you see in Lear's final moments?
- What message do you think Shakespeare wanted audiences to take from the ending?
- Do you think the ending is fair?
- How does Lear change from the beginning of the play?
- What lessons could modern readers learn from this tragedy?
